Dancing with Spina Bifida

Emma Never Danced, Now She Loves Dancing

Celebrate the Beat's inclusive dance program, made possible because of your gifts, transforms the lives of fourth and fifth grade students at Crested Butte Community School. Emma was born with spina bifida and used a wheelchair. At first, she was unsure about participating. How could she dance?

Emma's Celebrate the Beat instructor loved her vibrant energy and leadership ability in class. Inspired, she created a special piece that highlighted Emma's skills.

At the final performance, there wasn't a dry eye in the audience. Emma danced beautifully, exuding tremendous confidence. After the performance, her parents expressed gratitude that Emma was given the opportunity to shine in a way she never thought possible. School Principal Sally Hensley said, "Celebrate the Beat made magic happen for Emma."

herapy Scholarships Tackling Mental Health Obstacles

The need for immediate mental health services for the Gunnison Valley is at a critical point. While Colorado averages 1 mental health provider for every 350 people, Gunnison County has 1 for every 600 people. With suicide as the seventh leading cause of death locally and known community concerns of drug and alcohol abuse, the stress of a pandemic caused a heightened need for therapy for many in the community.

CB State of Mind (CBSOM), under fiscal sponsorship from CFGV and also a Gunnison Valley COVID-19 Recovery Fund grant recipient, has been successfully working to address this growing mental health crisis and prevent suicide. In April, CBSOM launched a scholarship program to provide access to short-term, affordable, and quality mental health care in the Gunnison Valley. These scholarships help those who are uninsured or underinsured connect to a local licensed therapist for up to 10 sessions for free. To date, CBSOM has given 34 scholarships enabling over 340 therapy sessions to those most in need.

HISPANIC AFFAIRS PROJECT Celebrating Immigrant

Inclusivity



Did you know the Gunnison Valley is home to the largest population of Cora-speaking people outside of Mexico? Hispanic Affairs Project (HAP), a Community Grants recipient, does an abundance of work to advance social and economic stability for immigrant families living and working in the Gunnison Valley. In the last year, HAP served 140 families by providing 17 individuals with immigration legal assistance, helping 16 people get first-time driver's licenses, and serving as an advocate for appropriate resources based on need.

HAP envisions Western Colorado communities where cultural diversity is recognized and immigrants have opportunities to contribute as integral members through active civic participation. You make it possible for CFGV to partner in that work – thank you!

Embarking on Educational Pursuits

The Gunnison Kiwanis Club Scholarship is awarded to a local graduating senior who demonstrates scholastic commitment, academic promise, a commitment to serving their community, and financial need. This year's recipient is Tristen Haus.

The Gunnison Memorial Scholarship, awarded to Faith Brock and Jennifer Mortensen in 2020, honors local students who were lost in a 1967 car accident. To date, 176 graduating seniors have received

assistance in their pursuit of higher education.

Jennifer Mortensen also received the Maxwell MacAllister Memorial Scholarship, a fouryear financial award to a local first-generation college attendee.

Velcome

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Before the coronavirus pandemic, over 14% of households in Gunnison County lived at or below the poverty level. That's a family of four living on less than \$25,926 per year. Yet, according to the Colorado Center on Law & Policy, a family of four needs an annual income of at least \$63,000 just to be self-sufficient in our state. Of course, self-sufficiency is even more difficult to achieve with the onset of COVID-19. With business closures, job furloughs, unexpected medical costs and more, COVID-19 has left many in our community in a precarious place.

CFGV's task was simple. Maryo Gard Ewell, CFGV's Director of Community Impact, set up a Zoom meeting in coordination with Mountain Roots and the Food Pantry. Those two organizations set about getting others to the initial meeting, and the Gunnison Valley Emergency Food Network (EFN) was born. So far, ten organizations are participating.

After sharing information, identifying resources and pointing out challenges, the group outlined the collective food needs for the Gunnison Valley community through the end of 2020. The result? Securing over \$163,000 in funding to get food to the people who need it - \$75,000 from CFGV's COVID-19 Recovery Fund and \$88,967 in matching funds.
